

Jim Brags Big





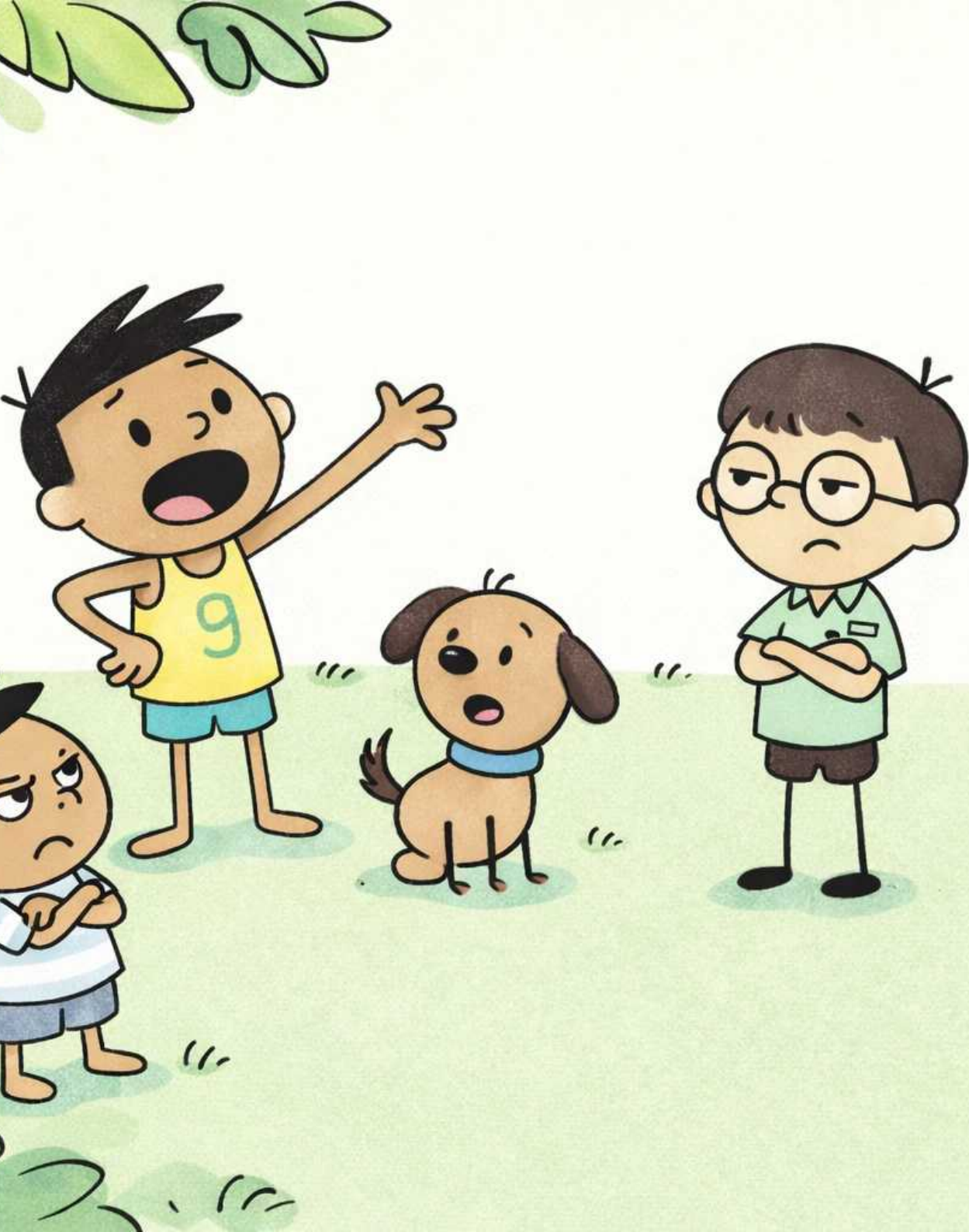
Jim dashes down the path with his pup. They zip past the bushes and into the park.

Jim watches with his mouth open. He wishes he had something that cool.





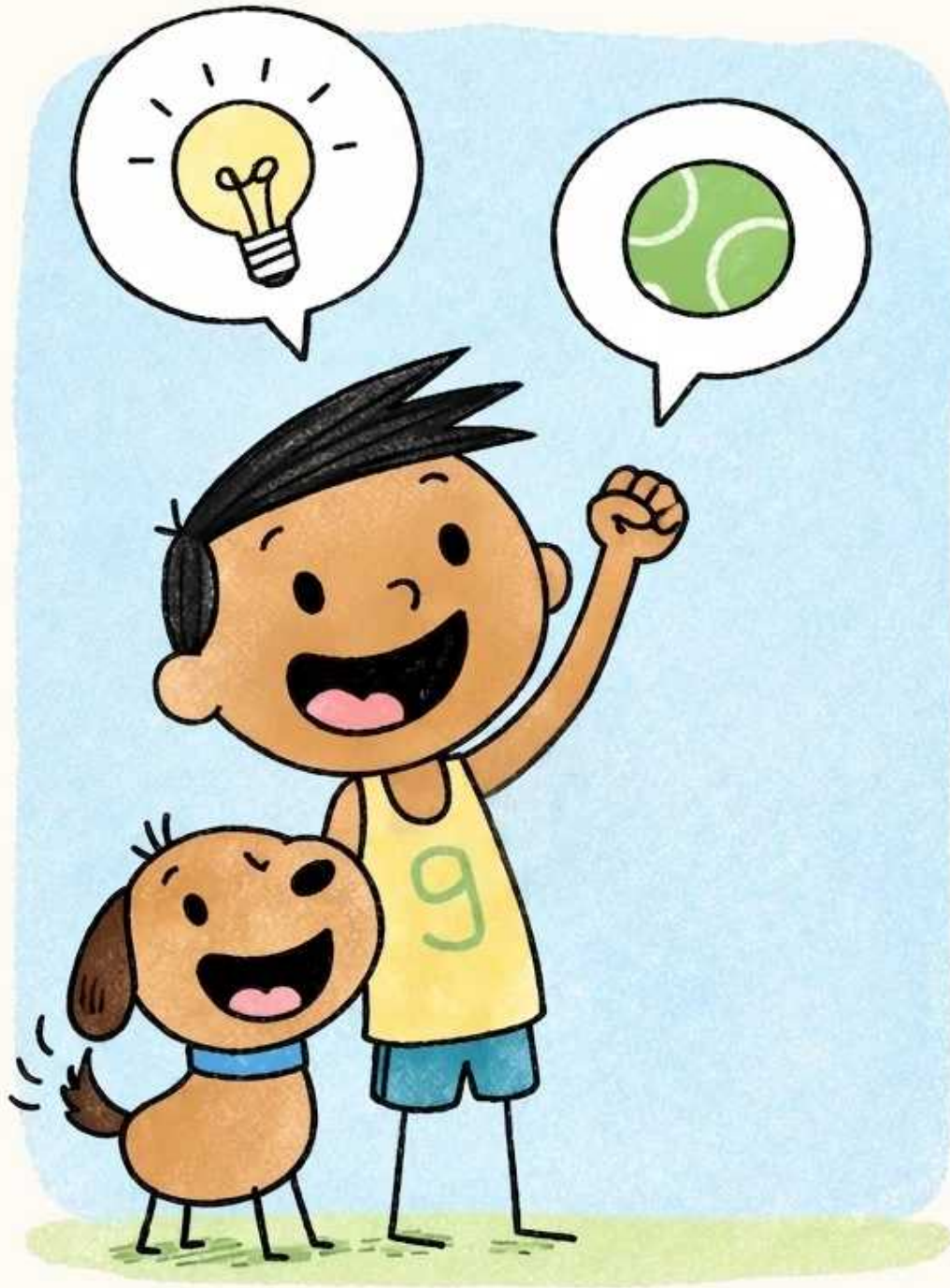
That is nothing!" Jim says. "I have the best stuff in the world back in my room!"

His pup sits nearby in a yellow scarf, looking like a tiny queen.

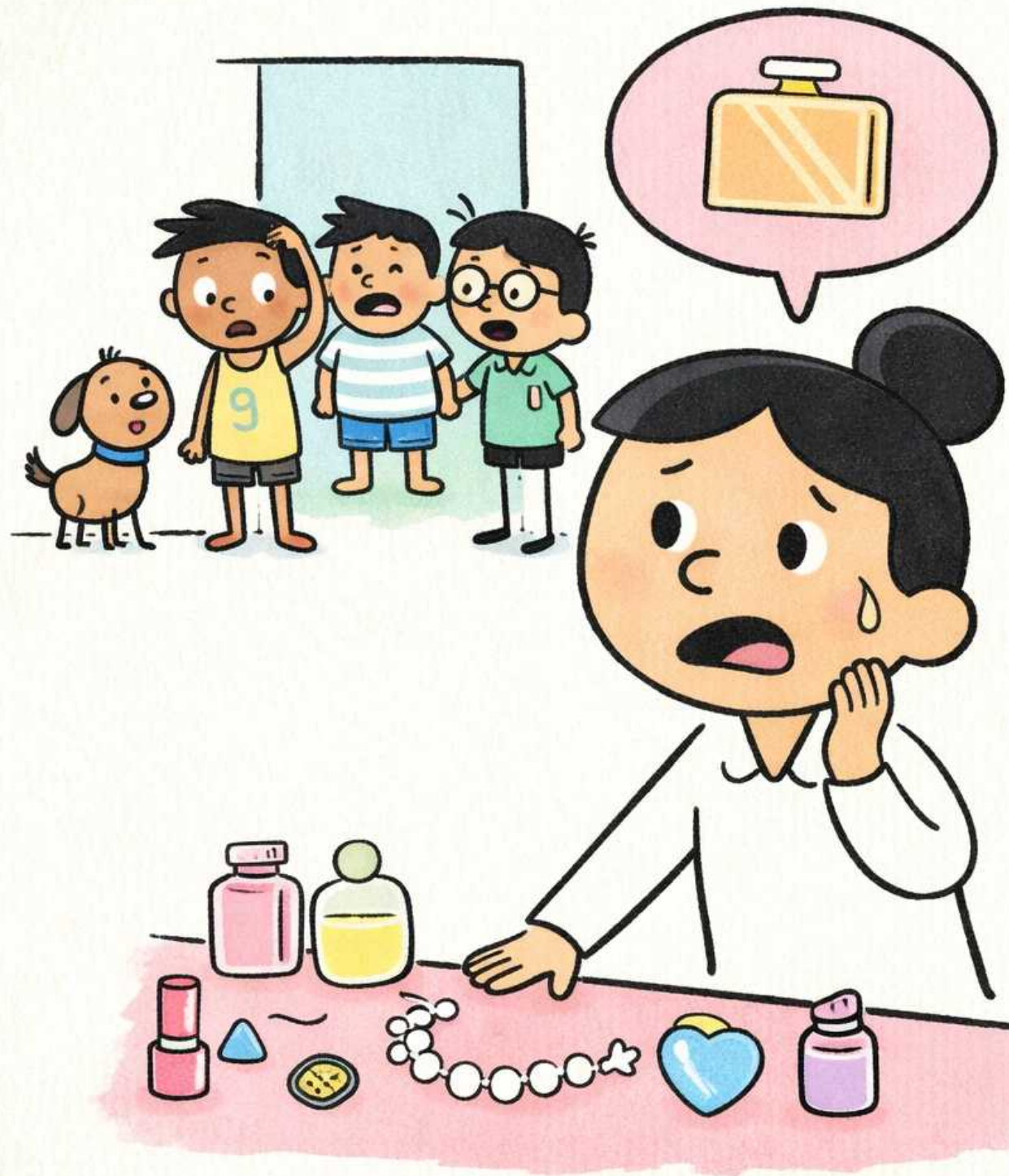


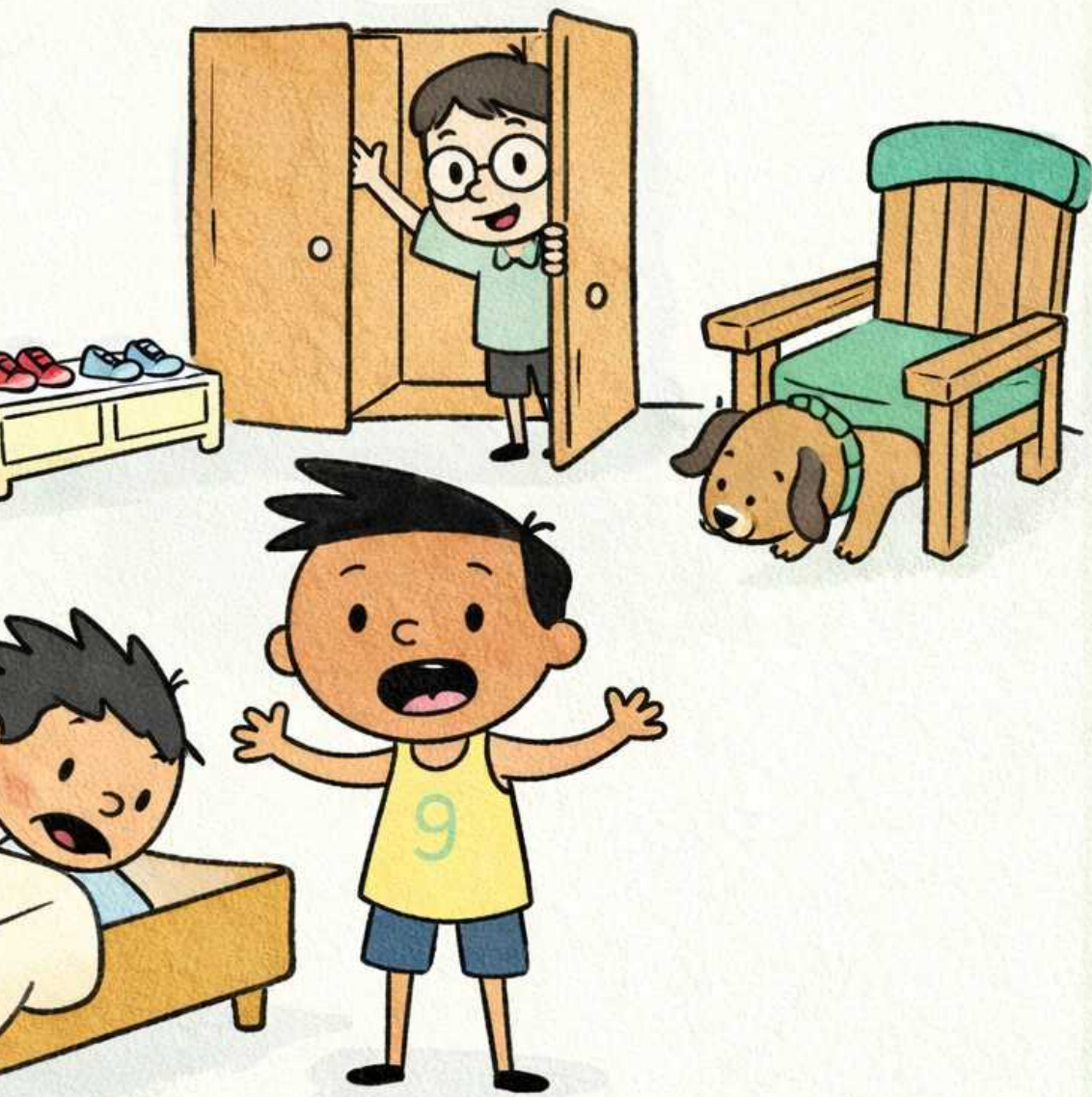
